What is **RUCONEST**?

Ruconest is an injectable prescription medicine that is used to treat acute attacks of hereditary angioedema (HAE) in adult and adolescent patients over the age of 12.

RUCONEST is a recombinant C1 esterase inhibitor, or C1-INH, and treats HAE swells at the source of the problem; by replacing the C1-INH your body needs.



97% of acute swells were successfully treated with **just one dose***



Relief that lasted **for at least** three days[†]



Most common side effects included headache, nausea, and diarrhea.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

Do not use RUCONEST if you have experienced lifethreatening immediate hypersensitivity reactions, including anaphylaxis, to RUCONEST or to any other C1 esterase inhibitor (C1-INH) product.

Call your healthcare professional or the emergency department right away if you experience: wheezing, difficulty breathing, chest tightness, turning blue (look at lips and gums), fast heartbeat, swelling, faintness, rash or hives. HAEA Guidelines Recommend: It's important to treat swells at the first sign, no matter where they start

Do not use RUCONEST if you have a known or suspected allergy to rabbits or rabbit-derived products. If you do not have a known rabbit allergy, testing is not required.

Tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including if you have a known allergy to rabbits. Tell your healthcare provider about any other medications you are taking, as some medications, such as birth control pills and certain androgens, can increase risk of clotting problems. Also tell your healthcare provider if you are pregnant, breastfeeding, or planning to do so.

Women with HAE: Additional questions to ask your doctor

- 1. How could being sexually active impact my HAE?
- 2. If I become pregnant, what do I need to know about my HAE therapies?
- 3. How could a pregnancy affect my HAE?
- 4. How could menopause affect my HAE?
- 5. What options for birth control are right for me?
